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Programs

Therapeutic Bodywork Practitioner

(100 independent study hours)

Naturopathy

Note: Each year of study consists of 240 in-class hours and 360 independent study hours.

(600 from 1st year program; 600 from 2nd year program = 1200 total hours)

(600 from 1st year program; 600 from 2nd year program; 600 from 3rd year = 1800 total hours)

(600 from 1st year program; 600 from 2nd year program; 600 from 3rd year; 600 from 4th year; plus 200 hours of internship* = 2600 total hours of study, 1160 supervised hours)

Holistic Doula Program

(120 in-class hours; 180 independent study hours; 100 hours internship* = 400 total hours)

* Internship hours – There is no additional charge for internship hours; students may not charge for their services during internship hours, and no fees will be paid to the Institute. Students will make arrangements with instructors to "shadow" or observe them during their professional practice. In this way, students can gain practical experience and have one-on-one time with their instructors to ask questions about what they have observed



Tuition and Payment Options

Therapeutic Bodywork Program Tuition: \$6600 per one-year program, discounted to \$5995 if full amount is paid prior to the start of the program. A payment plan is available subject to approval by the Institute: \$2000 down, \$383.33 per month for 12 consecutive months. [Smaller monthly payments are possible, with a balloon payment upon graduation.]

Natural Health Program Tuition: \$6200 per one-year program, discounted to \$5600 if full amount is paid prior to the start of the program. A payment plan is available subject to approval by the Institute: \$2000 down, \$350 per month for 12 consecutive months.

Holistic Doula Practitioner Program Tuition: \$2995 per program, discounted to \$2695 if full amount is paid prior to the start of the program. A payment plan is available subject to approval by the Institute: \$950 down, \$340.83 per month for 6 consecutive months.

(Tuition is subject to change without notice) A return check fee of \$30 will be charged for a check returned for any reason.



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 For all diploma students, tuition includes classes for the year, all books and class materials, graduation cap and gown, and participation in a graduation ceremony and dinner.

For Therapeutic Bodywork Practitioner and 1st Year Naturopathic students, tuition also includes a professional massage table (with leg bolster, face cradle and frame, and carrying case).

For Holistic Doula Program students, tuition includes a bag of birth-assisting supplies, such as essential oils, flower remedies, and homeopathic remedies commonly used during birth.

How to Enroll

Diploma Programs Registration

Students who wish to enroll in one of the diploma programs must present the following:

- 1. Copy of your high school diploma, transcript, GED, or equivalent;
- 2. Valid photo ID;
- 3. Payment of fees; and

the following forms (included with this catalog or available from the NITE office):

- 4. Completed NITE Enrollment Agreement form;
- 5. NITE emergency contact form;
- 6. Planned list of courses/dates you will be attending.

Two weeks written notice is required if there is a change in scheduled courses submitted. When no advanced notice is given, a \$100 re-take fee will be charged. Your seat in courses can be held without a copy of the high school diploma; however, no certificates or diplomas will be given until this document is received by the Institute.

Individual Class Registration for Non-Diploma Students

Diploma program classes can be taken on an individual basis without joining the diploma program. Students must register and pay for the class at least two days in advance of the class date. Students may enroll over the phone by calling (989) 773-1714 and using a credit card, or by completing an Individual Class Registration Form (available from the administrative office and online) and mailing it to the Institute with a payment of \$350. Many classes fill up early; waiting until the last few days is not recommended.

Orientation

Your final step is to attend an orientation. You may do so by making an appointment with the Director of Education or by attending a general orientation session prior to the program start date. Orientation dates are available from the administrative office. Orientation provides detailed information about what to expect during your program. Topics covered include attendance policy, how to get proper credit for homework, dress code, research paper guidelines, student ethics, and more. Students are welcome to have a spouse or parent attend orientation. Additionally, students will be given their books and professional equipment at orientation, provided they have registered in time to have all supplies delivered. Any books or equipment not available at orientation will be available at the Institute as soon as it arrives.

Class Information and Policies

Individual Classes

Tuition per individual class is \$350, which includes no books or supplies. A course manual will be provided, if appropriate. Payment is preferred *at least* 14 days prior to the class date. Enrollment is on a first-come basis, and a seat is guaranteed only after your payment is received. Participants will receive a Certificate of Attendance, provided they have 90% attendance, good participation in the class, and at least 75% on the test or quiz at the conclusion of the class.

Class Schedules

Regular classes start at 5:00 pm Friday and end at 9:00 pm. Saturday and Sunday hours are from 9:00 am to 6:00 pm with a 1-hour lunch and two breaks. Therapeutic Bodywork Practitioner *Labs* run from 8:00 am to 6:00 pm Saturday and Sunday; bring a lunch to eat during short breaks.

Class Availability

The Natural Health Educator (1st year) program, Therapeutic Bodywork Practitioner program and the Holistic Doula program course cycle is offered twice a year, approximately every 6 months. The NHT, NHP and CN Natural Health classes are available once a year, but can be joined at any time based on course <u>and</u> student eligibility.

Dual Enrollment

For those students interested in acquiring their diploma in a shorter amount of time, enrolling in multiple diploma programs is allowed. Although this requires some unique scheduling skills, the Director of Education can help you work out the details. We do recommend, however, taking your time to complete each program in its suggested order as you will be allowed to begin your practice before completion of any diploma program.

Weather

Classes generally remain in session regardless of weather conditions. In extreme weather, students will be contacted if the class is cancelled. If travel is unsafe for the student, last minute cancellations will be allowed.

Holidays

NITE will be closed on some official state and federal holidays.

A return check fee of \$30 will be charged for a check returned for any reason.

The foundation of this program, the first six classes include, but are not limited to, the following areas:

- Basic Swedish Style Massage long, connecting strokes and techniques designed to relax and reduce stress.
- Anatomy/Physiology the base from which we expand into the therapeutic application of massage. Learn the location, position, and function of the bones, major organs, muscles, and nerves in the body.
- Ethics and Professionalism, Equipment, Hygiene, Safety.
- Muscle Isolation positioning the client, palpating landmarks.
- Neuro-Lymphatic & Neuro-Vascular exploring pathways that supply and affect muscles and surrounding organs and systems.
- Neuro-Muscular contracting and releasing mechanisms accessed; helps provide longer lasting results.
- Fascia Alignment relaxing and moving connective tissue, which is primary to foundational balancing of the body as a whole.
- Manual Lymphatic Drain technique that encourages and directs lymphatic flow.
- Pregnancy and Infant Massage proper positioning for pregnant client's comfort; gentler strokes for infants to small children, including premature babies.
- Seated Chair Massage to provide shorter duration massages; important for office and conference settings.
- In-class Practical Experience actual supervised assessment and practice
- Supervised lab hours include practice of newly learned skills on classmates for the
- Beginning Bodywork lab and on volunteers for all other lab hours.

These classes provide instruction in more specialized techniques, blending them into a highly effective method of addressing imbalances in the body and enabling the therapist l hours per to facilitate healthy change. These techniques include:

- Continued practice in all Body Mechanics previously covered in classes 1 6.
- Meridian Balancing—effective method of working with and within the energy
- pathways of the body, including acupressure points and major chakra centers.
- CranioSacral Bodywork—gentle pressure along spine, cranial, and sacral areas to encourage spinal alignment and aid cerebrospinal fluid flow, helping clients with headaches, spinal injuries, and stored emotional traumas.
- Essential Oils & Emotional Balancing—integrating essential oils into specialized massages to boost the immune system, assist with proper spinal alignment, or release deep seated emotions.
- Reflexology—access reflex points on feet and hands to unblock, stimulate, and align the nervous system throughout the body, relieving sinus congestion, body tension, and boosting circulation and nourishment to internal organs.
- Nutrition & Bio-Chemistry—information about food, vitamins, and minerals that affect structural and overall health.
- Additional therapies on injury techniques, myofascia, and more will also be covered.
- Supervised lab hours include practice of newly learned skills on volunteers.

* These classes do not have a supervised lab.

Class 15 is the Final exam:

Testing includes written and oral examination, hands-on performance, demonstration of bone and muscle anatomy, and oral interviews.

Final Exam

(20 supervised hours per class session) Learn the importance of balance in proteins, fats, and carbohydrates; proper food combining; the difference between processed and unprocessed foods; proper use of vitamins and minerals.

Participate in the pregnancy, labor, birth, and infant care of three families; work in a variety of settings to gain experience in understanding how each individual birth is unique; share with other labor companions and midwives your individual journey.

Testing includes a written exam, practical demonstration of skills, and an oral exam

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Holistic Doula Program Classes

This program is designed to prepare students to assist in natural childbirth, both in the home and hospital setting. Unlike midwives who assist in delivering newborns, the Holistic Doula Program's focus is on supporting the mother through the pregnancy, birth, and early infancy phases. This program is unique to other birth assistant (doula) programs in that it includes training in multiple natural health modalities, such as nutrition, muscle testing, homeopathy, essential oils, and more.

> Understanding the nutritional benefits of herbs; their identification classes and proper use; learn to evaluate clients' needs through this unique, non-invasive technique.

Naturopathy for the Childbearing Year Explore the field of natural health in its many modalities with a focus on creating a healthier environment for conception; reducing infertility; supporting healthier pregnancies; reducing fears of birth defects and childhood illnesses.

> Build the foundation for understanding the many dimensions of the birthing process, including cultural, political, emotional, and hormonal, as well as other physical components; from the history of birth in the U.S. to deeply exploring pain's role and relief in labor; students will begin to understand how they might most effectively contribute to the birth journey of their clients; and also, what it means, personally and professionally, to attend to others in birth.

Experience through vivid stories the normal birth and its many variations, along with the role of the labor companion in medical or home settings; in addition to traversing the labor process in detail, students will learn to apply their knowledge of natural health to the unique experience of birth; topics include: facilitating informed consent, communication with birthing families and medical personnel, navigating medical interventions, postpartum care, and supporting families when birth does not go smoothly; this class offers the chance for students to bring all their knowledge together and become a Holistic Doula Program.

Class	Program	Description
Anatomy II*	Natural Health Therapist 2 nd year	Students will learn the function of each organ and its relation to surrounding organs' functions and balances. Energies of each organ will be discussed and how imbalances can affect health. Students will also learn about chemical reactions in the body, such as hormonal secretions and functions.
Anatomy III*	Natural Health Practitioner 3 rd year	Continuing the exploration of the body, students will gain perspective at a cellular level of the immune system, the nervous system, and detailed disease processes. Through this in-depth understanding of the human body, students are better equipped to help clients bridge the gap between medical procedures and natural health options.
Advanced Reflexology, Meridian Work, Root of Disease	Natural Health Practitioner 3 rd year	Taking reflexology to the next level, students will improve their technique; learn the reflexes of the hands and also energy centers on the feet. Meridian clearing will cover allergy improvement techniques as well as emotional healing through meridian points. The Beyond Bach portion of the class will introduce the 100+ remedies discovered after Dr. Bach's original work.
Anatomy, Body Systems, and Physiology	Natural Health Educator 1 st year	A study of each body system and its functions; signs of dysfunction, deficiency, and excess; how dysfunction in one system can interact with other systems. Anatomy includes the bones and muscles and their locations and actions; organ location; nerve tracts and tissue types. Physiology includes individual function of organs, the parts they play in systems and the body as a whole; relationship among muscle, organ, and nerve functions.
Biology	Natural Health Educator 1 st year	This class will include molecular structure and the periodic table; structure of foods, vitamins, minerals, and tissues; aerobic and anaerobic activity; what happens during digestion; what nutrients each system and/or organ is primarily composed of; and what elements each organ uses to function. Naturopathic Biology is fun!
Body Work I	Natural Health Educator 1 st year	Students will learn techniques for facilitating stress reduction massage and improving the lymphatic system, including the eight basic strokes of massage, proper body mechanics, draping the client for modesty, ethics, and professionalism. There is lots of hands-on practice. (Required: two flat sheets [full size], one fitted sheet [twin size] and 1 full size bath towel. Be prepared to undress down to your briefs or bring a pair of shorts.)
Body Work II*	Natural Health Therapist 2 nd year	How to assess clients; techniques include Fascia Alignment, Meridian Release, Neuro-vascular an Neuro-lymphatic treatments, Refined Palpation skills, Manual Lymphatic Drain, Neuro-muscular Facilitation, and refining of body mechanics.
Body Work III*	Natural Health Practitioner 3 rd year	A continuation of Body Work I and II, students use advanced bodywork techniques to address specific concerns, such as shoulder and neck pain, pelvis and tailbone discomfort, exhausted lymphatic and immune systems, and help the client to remain balanced in the structural muscular system—thereby, benefiting all other systems.
Conception, Childbirth, Childhood	Certified Naturopath 4 th year	An introduction to the art of midwifery, and to the herbs, oils, and homeopathics used prior to conception, for infertility, during childbirth, and for raising healthy children. This class teaches the naturopathy student how to prepare and assist clients through the childbearing and childrearing years.
Cranio Sacral Bodywork	Natural Health Therapist 2 nd year	This class will provide a base level understanding of Cranio Sacral Bodywork, which uses gentle pressure along the spine, cranial, and sacral areas to allow better flow of the cerebrospinal fluid. There are numerous emotional benefits to this unique technique, some of which can be noticed right away.
Death and Dying	Certified Naturopath 4 th year	This course has the objectives of training students to help others prepare for death and the dying process, creating awareness about the moment when the spirit leaves the body, and the journey to a peaceful departure. Most importantly, students will learn to assist family members and love ones to become active participants in this beautiful progression. Additional topics will include sudden or traumatic death situations and how to be an aid even to strangers. So many times, death is treated as a clinical event; however, you can learn how to make a difference in one of the most important journeys a human being will ever take. Class	Program	Description
Herb Walk	Natural Health Therapist 2 nd year	Students will have a unique opportunity to see the herbs growing in gardens specially prepared to enhance their healing energy and therapeutic value. The entire class will take place outside where students will observe planting patterns; patterns for energy and growth; how to establish their own gardens; proper replanting; when to harvest the herbs; identification of plants; and folk history about their uses and preparation for home use.
Herbs and Muscle Response Testing	Natural Health Educator 1 st year	This class will include how to classify herbs as bitter, aromatic, astringent, mucilaginous, and nutritive. We will cover the properties and uses of single and combinations of herbs throughout the world and their benefits. Included is the technique of muscle testing, which helps determine which organs and systems are most troubled and how to assist the body with supplementation.
Herbology II*	Natural Health Therapist 2 nd year	In this class, students will learn to make herbal preparations, including hot and cold infusions, syrups, tinctures, salves, and understand how planting and harvesting according to moon phases increase benefits. An in-depth study of the heating and cooling patterns of herbs includes how these procedures apply to each person's individual needs.
Herbology III*	Natural Health Practitioner 3 rd year	In this 3rd-level class, students will bring together all aspects of herbology: identifying, growing, transplanting, harvesting, drying, preparing, and applying. Students will be able to go from the field to the remedy while understanding each aspect of the process. Twenty key herbs will be studied in detail.

Holistic Getaway*	Certified Naturopath 4 th year	A week getaway to a mystery location where you and your fellow graduates will enjoy good food and the chance to put into practice the skills that you've acquired over the past four years. Herb identification, bodywork, magnet therapy, and sound and color therapy will strengthen, balance, and center you as you conclude your training and begin your path.
Homeopathy I	Natural Health Educator 1 st year	This class will include an explanation of homeopathy; how homeopathy works on the vital force within the body; and what the different strengths or dilutions of homeopathic remedies mean. Included are single homeopathic remedies for emergency situations and common ailments. Cell salts will be introduced.
Homeopathy II*	Natural Health Therapist 2 nd year	Building upon the foundations of homeopathy, students will begin to delve into constitutional homeopathy, learning keynotes of the polycrests. The success of homeopathic treatment for influenza will also be thoroughly discussed.
Homeopathy III*	Natural Health Practitioner 3 rd year	This class will refine repertorization skills for finding the correct homeopathic remedy. Key constitutional types will be explored in detail, and learning how to use more potent remedies in treatment will further advance the naturopath's use of homeopathy.
Homeopathy IV*	Certified Naturopath 4 th year	A continuation of Homeopathy I through III, this class covers the clearing of genetically inherited miasms of the family tree. Like the peeling of an onion, students will trace back through the original diseases of mankind to today's major health concerns. In addition, students will learn to use advanced naturopathic technology to create their own isopathic remedies.

Directed Study Assignments (homework)

Directed studies are designed to continue education and learning beyond the classroom. They are part of all programs, and students shall expect approximately 30 hours of assignments for each class period of 20 hours. The types of assignments vary. Some examples:

- 1. Book Summary (up to 15 hours of directed study): 5- to 10-page summary of a book or completion of study guide assigned by the instructor;
- 2. Lecture with visual aids and/or diagrams (5 hours of directed study): 1-hour lecture given by the student to ten or more people on the assigned subject. Student will provide an attendance sheet or letter of confirmation, which will be verified by NITE;
- 3. Practical Application Logs (1 hour of directed study for each hour logged): Students will practice and apply what they have learned in class on actual clients. Examples would include: massage, reflexology, craniosacral, iridology, muscle testing, magnets and polarity therapy, and more. Log sheets will be provided and clients will be contacted; no fees for these services will be paid to the Institute.
- 4. Anatomy Work Book (30 hours of directed study);
- 5. Create handouts, trifolds, and booklets for building clientele and business understanding (up to 10 hours of directed study);
- 6. Seminars: In the 3rd and 4th year Natural Health programs, students will advertise, create, and teach seminars in their home area and all proceeds will go directly to the student (up to 20 hours of directed study).

Additional types of studies may be assigned by the instructor, who will provide handouts in class specifying requirements, due dates, and number of hours.

Grading and Rules of Conduct

Grading

All test scores are figured using a percentage grading system (the number of correctly answered questions divided by the number of questions on the test). 75% or higher is considered passing. Practical Testing is graded on a checklist of areas to be done or covered by the student. The student must explain and/or demonstrate, to the satisfaction of the examiner, at least 75% of the items on the checklist. The student can be provided with a copy of the checklist to study for these exams. Oral exams can consist of any of the areas covered in the programs for which the student is testing. The examiner will ask questions, and the student will answer to the best of his/her ability. The student must score at least a 75% in each of these areas in order to pass. Final transcripts will include the following overall assessment ranking:

- 5 Professionally Competent, Exceptionally Skilled
- 4 Professionally Competent, Strongly Skilled
- 3 Professionally Competent
- 2 Needs Improvement
- 1 Unsatisfactory

Notification of Grades

Students receive evaluation of their status at the end of each class weekend. Final exam scores will be available at the end of the exam series.

In Cases of Non-Passing Grades

If a student does not pass any test, both class testing and final exams, they can apply for a retest. If the non-passing score is for a class that is part of a diploma program, the retest must be completed and passed before the student will be allowed to continue with the next class in the program. If the non-passing score is for a Certificate of Attendance, then the retest must be within 30 days. Only one retest is allowed. If the student does not pass the retest, they must take the class again with a \$100 retake fee.

Student Conduct

Students are expected to practice common courtesy and to respect fellow students' boundaries. Students must practice proper hygiene. No disruption of the class is acceptable. Soliciting of fellow students for products or services is not allowed. All cell phones must be turned off during class time. If the need arises, a student will be notified and given a verbal warning of the offensive behavior. If the situation is not resolved, the student will receive a written warning including the offense, the correction needed, and the results if not corrected. If the situation is not corrected, the student may be withdrawn from the class or program without refund. Students should refrain from drinking alcohol over the weekend of class and/or lab; any student whose clothing or breath has remnants of alcohol or drug usage will be asked to leave. Repeated offenses may be grounds for dismissal.

Re-entrance Policy

Any student dismissed for conduct, attendance, or non-passing grades will have the option of re-entry providing the following requirements are met.

- Conduct A six-month suspension, re-entry interview with the Director of Education to ensure student is ready to re-enter without reoccurrence of poor conduct.
- Grades or Attendance No suspension; a student may retake any class at a \$100 retake fee two additional times. After this, there will be no re-entry without re-enrolling and paying for the entire program again.

Attire

Attire should be modest. Casual/comfortable is suggested. Shoes are required at all times. Massage Students should be in NITE short-sleeved, collared shirts; comfortable pants (no jeans or sweats), or knee-length shorts. Socks and shoes must be worn at all times.

Refunds, Attendance, and More ...

Refunds

Diploma Programs: All tuition and fees paid by the applicant shall be refunded if requested within three business days after signing a contract with the school or if the applicant is rejected by the school before enrollment. All refunds shall be returned within 30 days. After the three day period has expired, all tuition fees are non refundable. Tuition will be held, however, for three years from the date of registration and is subject to tuition increases (once you register for a program, you have up to three years to complete the program before the original tuition payment expires).

If a student cannot attend a scheduled diploma class, a written notice must be given 14 days prior to the class date. At that time, the tuition will be moved forward to the next time the class is offered. If the notice is not received 14 days prior, then an additional \$100 retake fee is required to attend the class the next time it is available.

Individual Classes (non diploma students): If unable to attend a class already paid for, students receive no refund. However, with written notice two weeks prior to the class, fees will be moved to the next time that exact class is available. If less than a two-week notice is given, the class fee is forfeited. [In the case of veterans with financial support only, the amount charged will be an approximate pro-rata portion of the total.]

All tuition paid by the applicant shall be refunded if the applicant is rejected by the school before enrollment. All tuition and fees paid by the applicant shall be refunded if requested within 3 business days after signing a contract with the school. All refunds shall be returned within 30 days.

Attendance

Attendance Sheets

Students are responsible for signing in at the beginning of each class, out and in for lunch, and out at the end of the class. If you fail to sign, *for any section*, you are considered absent and lose the scheduled hours. If you have an emergency, you must call and notify the administration office. Excused absences will be considered on an individual basis. Students must maintain a 90% attendance record. If attendance



falls below 90%, the student must make arrangements for make up, if the instructor or the Director of Education approves.

Being Late

Classes begin as scheduled. The information that is covered in this highly-condensed weekend course format requires you to be on time. Missing class time is detrimental to your success in the class. You are required to be in attendance for 90 percent of the class. That means that you cannot miss more than 2 hours of class per weekend. However, be aware that in order to be considered for graduation for the year, you cannot have more than four unexcused hours total.

Excused Absences or Lateness

Requests must be in writing and sent to the administration office and will be considered on an individual basis. Consideration will be on what control the student had over the event.

Leave of Absence

A request for a leave of absence must be in writing. Each circumstance will be considered on an individual basis. We will do our best to accommodate each student with their needs. The first option is to apply their fees to the next time a course is offered. Keep in mind each diploma program is allowed 36 months to complete.

Extra Credit Hours

If a student needs to make up hours, then the instructor or administration can offer them during other classes or supervised opportunities at the Institute. These will all have a time limit and must be completed within that time in order for grades to be recorded.

Directed Study (homework) Due Date

Each class credited toward a diploma will have a Directed Study assignment. The assignment is due 30 days after the completion of the class in the Massage program and 60 days in the Naturopathic programs. Any Directed Study not completed on time will require the student to apply for an extension. Extensions are \$50 and are due at the time the Directed Study was due. Each class can have two extensions. After that, the class must be retaken for \$100.

Graduation Requirements for Diploma Programs

Graduation requirements for a diploma program include:

- 90% attendance with satisfactory participation in each of the classes, plus testing, required for each specific program;
- 75% or better on every class test;
- 75% or better on each part of the final exam: written, oral, practical; successful completion and submission by the due date of directed study assignments (see pages 8 and 9);
- Research paper topic (Natural Health Programs) chosen and approved by 3rd class; 20 to 50 pages, typed, double-spaced and turned in at least 60 days prior to final exam weekend; completion of the program within 36 months of starting date; for Certified Naturopath Diploma candidates, an additional 200 hours of internship* must occur before graduation.

* Internship hours – There is no additional charge for internship hours; students may not charge for their services during internship hours, and no fees will be paid to the Institute. Students will make arrangements with instructors to "shadow" or observe them during their professional practice. In this way, students can gain practical experience and have one-on-one time with their instructors to ask questions about what they have observed.

Certificates of Attendance

Both diploma program students and individual class participants are awarded Certificates of Attendance for classes that are successfully completed. Note: Therapeutic Bodywork Practitioner students receive all certificates of attendance and diploma at the end of the program and after all tuition fees have been paid.




